

Integrated Services Cycle of Intervention focusing on key transition points




Interventions cover holistic, multi agency, multiprofessional coordinated approaches which embrace early years, family support, mental health, education/learner support and youth support

The Framework Outcome

The outcomes framework is supported by a number of themes including:

- The need to adopt a 'whole child/family' approach
- Partnership/inter-agency working
- Securing and harnessing the support of parents, carers and communities
- Making a gradual shift to preventative and early intervention approaches
- Ensuring that the needs of children are fully assessed and that services provided are based on identified needs and evidence about what works

Model Team



ISCYP provide an integrated delivery model focusing in on early intervention at point of need and providing services around children, young people and families in partnership with our multi-agency partners. This model provides a locality solution to meet the needs of those most vulnerable families in our community by harnessing scarce resources in the most effective solution with all key stakeholders.

The Impact:

- An integrated delivery model will make the most effective use of limited resources to improve the outcomes for our most at risk children, youth and families
- Integrated/multiagency partnership working which involves statutory agencies, community and voluntary organisations, will deliver the most effective impact to recipients of service
- Principles of Integration can be applied to tackle the deep seated generational disadvantage across Belfast and N.I.
- Collaborative mainstream funding will enable ongoing effective delivery of an integrated working model.
- This has always been an ambitious agenda that requires a commitment to a fundamental realignment of mainstream funding to effect long term beneficial change.
