Over 600 pupils aged 14-15years from four post primary schools in Carrickfergus recently had the opportunity to find out more about local services that can support young people experiencing issues such as bullying, drugs and alcohol, mental health problems, social media, volunteering, domestic violence, general health and wellbeing and physical activity.

The 8th Annual Youth Fair at Oakfield Community Centre, Carrickfergus was hosted by the Carrickfergus Raising Attainment Group and the CYPSP Carrickfergus Locality Planning Group. The event offered students from Carrick College, Carrickfergus Grammar, Downshire School and Ulidia Integrated College a chance to find out more about services and activities in the local area and how to seek help when they are in need.

Hedley Webb, Principle of Carrickfergus College School spoke following the event and said “this was another successful Youth Fair run by CYPSP and the 4 Post

Primary school in Carrickfergus. The schools were delighted with the range and diversity of exhibitors in attendance and this year's topic was Resilience, a topic which is very relevant to all post primary schools”.

The main themes of the fair were resilience and gender identity. Over 20 voluntary, community and statutory organisations attended, providing local information and advice relevant to the young people.
